Welcome!

We are pleased to invite public contributors to join the upcoming joint National Institute for Health and Care Research (NIHR) **Biomedical Research Centre (BRC) and UK Clinical Research Facility (CRF) Network Conference**.

This is a unique opportunity to gain insight into clinical research, engage with professionals, meet other public contributors, and contribute to discussions about how clinical research is designed and delivered.

About the Conference Organisers:

- **Biomedical Research Centres (BRC)**: These centres bring together researchers, doctors, and patients to develop and test new treatments, diagnostics, and medical technologies. They focus on experimental medicine, which means studying how diseases work and testing new ways to treat them before they become widely available. They speed up the process of turning research into real-world healthcare improvements.
- Clinical Research Facilities (CRF): A CRF is a purpose-built space, usually in a hospital, where medical research takes place. CRFs have expert teams, including nurses and doctors, who run the research studies and make sure everything is safe. CRFs also have specialist equipment, like research beds, labs, and scanning machines, to help test new treatments and improve healthcare.
- UKCRF Network: This is a group that connects and supports CRFs across the UK and Ireland. The Network helps CRFs share knowledge, improve how research is done, and makes sure studies run smoothly.





About the Conference

This is a professional conference attended mainly by staff working in clinical research, with a focus on skills development, research delivery, and clinical improvements. There is expected to be at least 800 delegates in attendance.

While public contributors are not the primary audience, we value your participation and the unique perspectives you bring. This is a great opportunity for you to expand your knowledge of clinical research and to support future research involvement activities.

The conference includes workshops on public involvement and improving access to research. A few sessions will include a presentation from a patient or public contributor sharing their experience.

• Title: Co-create to Translate: Achieving Impact through Collaboration

"Translate" in this context, means turning research ideas into practical improvements in healthcare. The conference theme is about how we are working together to achieve this goal. Healthcare research bridges the gap between discovery and real-life benefits to ensure that new ideas lead to better treatments and care for everyone.

Defining 'Public Contributor'

'Public contributor' is an umbrella term used to describe members of the public who are involved in clinical research public partnerships activities.

We use the definition of 'public' to include patients, potential patients, carers and people who use health and social care services as well as people from organisations that represent people who use services. In other contexts, other terms are used, for example public members or public partners.

What to Expect as a Public Contributor

- **Engagement & Learning:** Listen to talks and take part in workshops to learn about new areas of clinical research.
- **Networking:** Meet and chat with professionals and other public contributors throughout the conference.
- Reserved tables at breaks to help you meet other public contributors.
- **Posters:** Read about research and projects being carried out in CRFs and BRCs. You might also have the chance to help create posters with staff at your local CRF or BRC.
- Flexibility & Breaks: The conference will be busy, so feel free to take breaks whenever you need. We'll provide information on quiet areas and places to relax.





Conference Highlights

- **Working Together:** See how clinical trials are planned and carried out with input from researchers and the public.
- Join discussions and activities designed to help researchers understand how to better integrate public involvement in clinical research.
- **New Ways of Working:** Find out how technology, including artificial intelligence (AI) and digital data, is improving clinical trials.
- Meet and Connect: Chat with researchers and other public contributors.
